The Highland Historical Society was originally formed in the 1980's, for the purpose of creating and publishing a revised history Con't on page 2



of the county. The results can be seen in the very successful "The New History of Highland County," which is still available for sale from The Recorder, and from the Society's table at the Maple Festival.

The Society was re-activated in 1995 and has since been involved in many projects - including the McDowell Battlefield Days in May, in plans to survey and catalog historic sites and structures in the county, in the microfilming of all of the county newspapers dating back into the 1800's, in collecting genealogical records and local histories, of putting up signs identifying the smaller towns in the county, supporting and working with other organizations to provide trails, markers and parking at the site of the McDowell Battlefield, and in financing the restoration of rare old county documents.

### MAY 8, 1862

n May 8, 135 years ago about 9,000 Rebel soldiers and an almost equal number of Yankees converged on Robert Sitlington's farm and the little village of McDowell.

1862 had opened with Union and Confederate forces jockeying for position throughout the western part of Virginia, and West Virginia. The Shenandoah Valley, known as "Breadbasket of the Confederacy," held provisions for the southern army, and also had Staunton, a major center supply and transportation network where two major roads and a railroad crossed. Months earlier. Gen. "Stonewall" Jackson had stated: "If this Valley is lost, Virginia is lost." It was in McDowell, on the slopes of Sitlington's Hill, that Federal troops ( under Milroy and Schenck) moving toward Staunton were successfully repelled by Confederates (under "Allegheny" Johnson, reinforced by the brigades of Taliaferro and Campbell [under Jackson]). In a little more than four hours, 180 men lay dead, and many of the more than 600 wounded were being tended in makeshift hospitals quickly established in the Presbyterian church and in local Federal troops retired homes. beyond McDowell, and Jackson's army took up the pursuit the next day (leaving behind a detachment of cavalry and the VMI Cadet Battalion to guard Federal prisoners - mostly wounded), chasing the Federals through Monterey, and up the South Branch valley to West Virginia.

This battle was the first Confederate victory in Jackson's brilliant Valley Campaign. It forc Milroy and Schenck out of the Valley, preventing them and the rest Fremont's command from uniting with Banks' force. relieving the pressure on Richmond: it kept "the Breadbasket" for the South, and it left Jackson free to operate against his enemies separately - a key to his phenomenal success in the Shenandoah Valley in the months to . On May 9, he announced the outcome with a one-sentence message to General Cooper in Richmond: "God blessed our arms with victory at McDowell yesterday."

McDowell remains the last undeveloped, unspoiled battlefield area from the Valley Campaign, allowing a unique chance to understand and experience wh took place there on May 8, 1862. The Presbyterian Church stands today as it did then, and still bears the scars of a cannonball hit and the names and dates which were carved into the bricks on the front of the church by the soldiers.

## McDowell Battlefield Days - 1997

The second McDowell Battlefield Days, sponsored by the Highland Historical Society and the Highland Chamber of Commerce was held on the weekend of May 10-11, 1997, and despite bitterly cold weather (which some felt to be a perhaps overly-accurate representation of the weather experienced at the battle in 1862), both the public and reenactors all expressed great satisfaction with the event.

### rcDowell Battlefield Days con't

Coast arrived on Friday night, May 9 and "occupied" McDowell, setting up camps and picket lines. Union soldiers held firm command of the village until the morning of the 10th, when the Confederate troops began skirmishes which led up to the Reenactment of the Battle of McDowell. Routing the Union troops, under the eyes of well-over 300 spectators, the Rebels held many of the Federals captive at the McDowell Presbyterian Church, where "medical treatment" of the wounded occurred, as it did in 1862. On Sunday, after some skirmishes pushing the Union troops westward, period worship services at the church were held for the enactors and the public.

Thanks to generous cooperation from local residents of McDowell, all who attended felt that they had experienced a truly unique weekend which gave them a truer understanding of the events at McDowell in May, 1862.

## HIGHLAND'S FIRST MAP RESTORED BY THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

#### PRINTS AVAILABLE FOR PURCHASE FOR THE FIRST TIME

Thanks to the Society's Life Member Clay Hamilton's initial concept and dedicated help in getting it accomplished, the Highland Historical Society restored the 1847 Campbell Map of the county.

Found hanging in the courthouse, it was taken to a professional restorer in Washington, D.C. who repaired, bleached and backed the fragile map, which contains the names and locations of residents and places in the county - all written in the meticulous handwriting of the county's first surveyor and mapmaker, Thomas Campbell.

The original map will hang, in a new archival mat and frame, in the courthouse. A limited edition of extremely handsome, full-sized prints of the map are now available for purchase from the Historical Society. A printed list of the names found on the map, a brief biography of Campbell, and a handsome border have been added - to enhance the print.
